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HIGHLIGHTS 2009-10

The AMC provided research opportunities to twenty students; supported nine student presentations at national and international Metropolis conferences; implemented an NGO-based student internship program and initiated the first annual student essay contest; AMC research affiliates supervised fourteen Master's and doctoral theses.

Scholars affiliated with the AMC produced 110 publications, 61 conference papers and generated \$1,018,339 in new, external research money.

The AMC awarded \$140,000 in research grants to 10 scholars representing four different universities in Atlantic Canada.

The AMC and its domains delivered 25 knowledge translation/mobilization activities including a *Welcoming Communities in Nova Scotia Symposium* in partnership with the Nova Scotia Office of Immigration.

Five knowledge mobilization projects received funding and the AMC produced and widely distributed its first *Atlantic Metropolis Policy Briefing Notes* booklet.

In November the AMC offices moved to the brand new Atrium Bldg. on Saint Mary's University campus.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Ce rapport annuel du Centre Métropolis Atlantique fait état des activités entre le 1er avril 2009 et le 31 mars 2010. Il marque également la seconde année dans la phase III du projet Métropolis (2007 — 2012). Cette deuxième année de la phase III a été très fructueuse pour le CMA et a vu de nombreux projets nouveaux et publications, ainsi que plusieurs activités visant le transfert de la connaissance.

Créé en janvier 2004, le Centre Métropolis Atlantique met en évidence les perspectives et les préoccupations de la région atlantique relatives aux politiques stratégiques nationales du projet Métropolis et de ses partenaires fédéraux. Le CMA est affilié à quatre autres centres Métropolis (établis en 1996) et fait partie d'un réseau transnational lié au projet Métropolis international.

Le CMA a pour but principal de contribuer à l'élargissement des connaissances relatives aux politiques et aux tendances dans le secteur de l'immigration, aux changements et aux migrations de la population ainsi qu'aux priorités et aux programmes relatifs à l'immigration sur le plan régional et national. Étant donné que l'immigration devient depuis quelques années une plus grande préoccupation au Canada atlantique et une réalité plus connue, le CMA concentre ses efforts sur l'attraction, l'intégration et la rétention des nouveaux immigrants dans les communautés anglophones et francophones.

Le CMA œuvre dans les deux langues officielles à partir des bureaux de Halifax et de Moncton, favorisant la promotion d'un dialogue entre les communautés linguistiques et de divers milieux. Grâce à l'appui des universités de la région, les cinq groupes ou domaines

de recherche régionaux du Centre peuvent rassembler des chercheurs, des organismes communautaires, des fournisseurs de service aux immigrants ainsi que des responsables de l'élaboration de politiques sur le plan municipal, provincial et fédéral (voir les résumés des domaines dans l'annexe A).

The AMC is managed by three Directors – Dr. Madine VanderPlaat, Saint Mary's University (lead university), Dr. Chedly Belkhodja, Université de Moncton and Dr. Marguerite Cassin, Dalhousie University. The five domains/priority areas housed at the AMC are briefly described below.

The *Gender, Migration and Diversity/ Immigrant Women* research domain provides a unique entry point to identify issues of particular relevance to immigrant women that might otherwise be overlooked. The objective is to provide a regional and national focus for gender-based analysis of immigration and diversity. This domain has a specific focus on the *Family, Children and Youth* policy priority area. (Domain Leaders: Dr. Evie Tastsoglou and Dr. Alexandra Dobrowolsky, Saint Mary's University).

The *Economic and Labour Market Integration* research domain investigates the economic effects of immigration, economic performance of immigrants and the role of socioeconomic factors in attracting and retaining immigrants in smaller and rural communities. (Domain Leaders: Dr. Ather Akbari, Saint Mary's University and Dr. Ted MacDonald, University of New Brunswick)

Cette priorité de recherche permettra de déterminer quels instruments de politique publique sont les plus propices à contribuer à la capacité du Canada, de ses villes et de ses collectivités à recevoir et à intégrer avec succès les immigrants, les réfugiés et les membres de minorités. Elle présentera également l'occasion d'identifier, selon des méthodes empiriques, des pratiques exemplaires qui pourront être adaptées de sorte à être mises en œuvre dans d'autres contextes. (Domain Leaders : Dr. Sylvia Kasparian et Dr. Cristophe Traisnel, Université de Moncton)

Canada's immigration program, like its multicultural approach to inclusion, is designed to bring benefits to Canadian society as well as an offer of a better life to immigrants, refugees, and their immediate families. It is not only the Canadian economy that feels the effects of immigration. Accordingly, the *Citizenship, Social and Civic Integration/ Citoyenneté et intégration sociale, culturelle et civique* domain looks at the social and cultural effects of immigration and diversity on Canada and will determine the extent to which there are risks to societal well-being, to full participation of the members of these groups as citizens, and to the cohesion of Canadian society overall. (Domain Leader : Dr. Pauline Gardiner-Barber, Dalhousie University).

Concerns over social cohesion and national security, especially the contemporary preoccupation with terrorism, have raised the public profile of debate surrounding how Canada and its justice and security systems can ensure a balanced and fair approach to an increasingly diverse population - to maintain order, public safety and national security while preserving civil liberties and the Canadian multicultural model of an open, diverse society. These are the challenges facing the *Justice, Policing and Security* domain. (Domain Leader: Dr. Jean-Francois Thibault, Université de Moncton).

2.0 Training Activities

A total of twenty-four students and one non-student were provided with training opportunities in 2009-2010. The majority of these individuals were employed as research assistants on AMC or externally-funded research projects. This figure also includes two master's students employed as interns within relevant NGOs, and two master's students hired as office assistants to help with various projects at the AMC office. Table 2.1 indicates the number of students who have participated in the AMC in various capacities during the reporting period.

In the winter of 2010 the AMC launched a new initiative and sponsored two students to work as interns in two NGOs: the Halifax Refugee Clinic (Halifax, Nova Scotia) and le Centre d'accueil et d'intégration des immigrants et immigrantes de Moncton Métropolitain (Moncton, NB), during January-May 2010.

At CAIIMM, the intern worked on a guide to the school system for immigrant parents, and interviewed families to evaluate CAIIMM service-delivery. He also researched possible partnerships and funding opportunities. The intern at the Halifax Refugee Clinic was involved

in its collaborative community project “Invisible Women/Concrete Barriers”, which seeks to spread awareness of the issues and obstacles faced by refugee women and, by extension, refugee claimants in Nova Scotia, and the need for policy changes in this area.

Two master’s students were also hired as office assistants during the reporting period to help with various projects including the Welcoming Communities Symposium, the Annual Symposium, and widespread distribution of the AMC Policy Briefs across the region.

The AMC sponsored seven students to attend the 12th National Metropolis Conference in Montreal (see Appendix B.3) and two students were funded to present at the 14th International Metropolis Conference in Copenhagen.

3.0 Research

3.1 Publications

In 2009-10 researchers affiliated with the AMC produced 14 books, 41 book chapters, 39 journal articles, and 27 other publications. Table 3.1 depicts the distribution of publications across domains. There is slight duplication of numbers across domains due to the interdisciplinary nature of some of the works. A full list of publications is included in Appendix C.1.

3.2 Grant Competition

In June 2009 a Call for Proposals was launched for a special strategic grant of up to \$50,000, strategic grants of up to \$20,000, as well as pilot projects up to a maximum of \$5,000. 4.0 Knowledge Transfer/Mobilization Activities

Knowledge transfer and mobilization activities were a primary focus for the AMC in 2009-10.

A plan for 2009-10 Knowledge Mobilization Activities was prepared which includes a Knowledge Mobilization Projects Competition, seminars with leading researchers, brown bag sessions, co-sponsored events, two student competitions, and an initiative to explore and strengthen the policy relevance of working papers and policy briefs through the implementation of a communication plan (Appendix D.1).

4.1 Centre Activities

AMC 2009-10 Policy Research Symposium

The AMC held its 5th Annual Policy Research Symposium (formerly Strategic Planning Retreat), May 13-14, 2009 at The Delta Charlottetown, Charlottetown, Prince-Edward-Island. The event was attended by approximately 36 researchers, NGO representatives and government partners.

The meeting included workshops and presentations addressing the following topics:

- Small Area Immigration
- Immigration Decision-Making
- Challenges of Immigrant Attraction and Retention to PEI

Participating federal partners included Citizenship and Immigration Canada, Canadian Heritage, and ACOA. Non Governmental Organizations included : Our partner The Prince Edward Island Association for Newcomers to Canada and La Coopérative d'intégration francophone de l'Î.-P.-É, Le Réseau national de développement économique francophone. There were representatives from the cities of Charlottetown, Moncton and the Town of Stratford as well as the Prince-Edward Island Population Secretariat and Public Service Commission. The Welcoming Communities in Nova Scotia Symposium

The AMC sponsored and organized the *Welcoming Communities in Nova Scotia Symposium*, together with the Nova Scotia Office of Immigration. This one-day public event which was held on March 4th, 2010 in the Delta Halifax Hotel in Halifax attracted more than 120 attendees over half of whom were government and community partners. Four panels representing the government, non-government, community and business levels discussed strategies to make Nova Scotia a more welcoming place for immigrants. The panels were bilingual, with Citizenship and Immigration Canada covering the cost of simultaneous translation. The Symposium garnered highly positive feedback.

“...the welcoming communities event was very successful. I was at a meeting last week of community members and at least four of the participants around the table mentioned the event as a catalyst for them getting involved in immigrant/welcoming communities issues!”

Other participants noted the panels and organization were “excellent”, while the panelists were described as “informative” and “knowledgeable”. It was recommended to hold similar

events on a yearly basis, and to include practical example of case studies of successful welcoming communities initiatives.

4.3 Domain Activities

Each of the five research domains participated in the creation of networks, partnerships and continued collaboration with other researchers. The domain leaders and members contributed to knowledge mobilization through a variety of activities including domain-sponsored visiting speakers, round tables and meetings and participation at regional, national and international conferences.

AMC and its domains have delivered over 40 events this past year (see Table 4.1 below). The full list of events is available in Appendix D.4.

4.4 Communities and NGO Capacity-Building Activities

The AMC conducted several NGO and Community activities, which have been addressed under the rubric of Knowledge Transfer events and projects. For example, the Knowledge Transfer project *ISIS Knowledge Transfer with NGOs* involved a series of knowledge transfer events targeting staff of immigrant settlement agencies throughout the Atlantic region, with the goal of raising awareness of NGO staff of Metropolis research.

About a third of the attendees of the Welcoming Communities Symposium were immigrants, and the event was designed specifically to discuss and explore the concept of welcoming communities from different perspectives.

The AMC-sponsored Internship Program, which was already been mentioned under the rubric of Training Activities, was specifically designed to enhance NGO capacity by providing two immigration-related agencies with the chance to hire students for specific projects.

On December 9, 2009, 12 staff of one of our partner NGOs, ISIS, attended an interactive presentation by Ather Akbari, co-leader of AMC's Economic and Labour Market domain. Entitled *Attraction & Retention of Immigrants in Atlantic Canada*, it received very positive feedback and was taped for distribution to members of the Atlantic Region Association of Immigrant Serving Agencies so that staff may learn from and respond to research undertaken through AMC.

The AMC will continue to focus on and improve outreach to community members and foster an active interest in immigration-related issues throughout 2010-11.

5.0 Network Activities

5.1 Regional and National Partnerships, Collaborations and Networking

The AMC engages in partnership, collaboration and networking activities aimed at developing research capacity, increasing the profile of the centre, leveraging research funds, and extending the research network. Domains have established successful local partnerships which include:

SSHRC, CIC, Canadian Heritage, Status of Women Canada, Nova Scotia Advisory Council on the Status of Women, Nova Scotia Department of Education; Immigrant Settlement and Integration Services (ISIS), Multicultural Association of Nova Scotia (MANS), Maritime Centre of Excellence for Women's Health., Nova Scotia Office of Immigration, Immigrant Women's Group, YMCA, Pier 21 Newcomers Program, and the Atlantic Population Table. Details of individual partners for each domain are listed separately in Appendix A.

Staff from the Halifax AMC office participated in various meetings, public lectures and conferences. In November 2009, Shiva Nourpanah attended the 1st Newcomer's Forum held in Sydney, Cape Breton, an event designed to promote and welcome newcomers in that area. At that event, Metropolis materials and publications were distributed and contacts were made with the local development authorities. AMC staff also attended the Human Trafficking Awareness Symposium hosted by Halifax Refugee Clinic. Collaborative relationships have been fostered with NGOs in the region. All of the domain leaders engage with academic, government and NGO partners locally and nationally on a regular basis, both through the domain committees and in project-based research work.

5.2 International Linkages and Collaborations

AMC researchers continued to expand networks internationally and strategically build linkages with colleagues working on migration issues in a number of countries in Europe, Africa, Asia and Australasia.

Contours of Citizenship: Women, Diversity and Practices of Citizenship (**Margaret Abraham**, Hofstra University, **Esther Ngan-ling Chow**, American University, **Laura Maratou-Alipranti**, National Centre for Social Research, Greece and **Evangelia Tastsoglou**, Saint Mary's University) has just been published and may be ordered (please consult our website under "Other Publications". The book is a peer-reviewed publication with Ashgate Publishers. It includes selected papers from an international conference that the team organized in Athens, Greece in 2007 for the Research Committee on "Women in Society" (RC 32) of the International Sociological Association. A great deal of that publication focuses on international migration. In addition, Dr. Tastsoglou participated in the last three years in a large EU-based project, FEMIPOL, funded by the European Commission. The project ended last May and E. Tastsoglou was invited to Brussels for the final international workshop where she was the policy commentator. She also gave a paper on the concept of "immigrant integration." A number of European research teams participated from various countries (Germany, U.K, Italy, France, Spain, Portugal, Greece, Cyprus, Poland, Slovenia).

Evie Tastsoglou and Alexandra Dobrowolsky also organized events in Halifax with colleagues from overseas. These events include two public lectures by Dr. Xanthi Petrinioti (Department of International and European Studies, Panteion University, Athens and Co-Director of the Mediterranean Migration Observatory) at Dalhousie University and the University of New Brunswick, and a lecture by Dr. Margaret Abraham from Hofstra University, New York. These events were partially sponsored by AMC and Research Domain funds.

Ce réseau regroupe des chercheurs européens, africains et australiens. Enfin, il collabore avec Neils Kalbunde, doctorant à la Humbolt University de Berlin sur un projet de recherche autour des étudiants internationaux. Maintenant en sabbatique, il continue de développer des partenariats avec des intervenants en Europe.

Christophe Traisnel a travaillé sur le rôle de l'immigration francophone dans la construction du discours identitaire des mouvements communautaires en Acadie, au Québec et en Wallonie. Cette recherche exploratoire lui a permis de développer un certain nombre de contacts en Belgique, notamment avec la Fondation Wallonne, basée sur le campus de Louvain-la-Neuve, l'Institut Jules Destrée, la revue communautaire wallonne "Toudi", avec certains groupes communautaires de la ville de Bruxelles, ainsi qu'avec des spécialistes des questions d'immigration et d'intégration (CEDEM, Université de Liège).

Pauline Gardiner Barber, Domain Leader of the Citizenship & Social, Cultural and Civic Integration, was invited to present a paper in the Migration Initiative Seminar Series: New Landscapes of Labour Migrations at the University of Copenhagen in the week following the International Metropolis conference in September. She also participated in an invited panel on migration policy at the American Anthropology Association conference in December. In March 2010, she travelled to Manila to complete further research on her SSHRC funded research project on global migration. While in Manila she met with various immigration consultants and immigration experts, as well as skilled immigrants preparing to depart for Canada. She has plans and funding to complete further research on Filipino global migrants in Rome at some point during the coming year.

The three AMC directors as well as domain leaders Pauline Gardiner-Barber and Alexandra Dobrowolsky, NGO affiliates Gerry Mills, Jan Sheppard Kutcher, student affiliates Catherine Bryan and Sinzian Chira attended the 15th International Metropolis Conference in Copenhagen, Denmark, where they networked with colleagues from around the world and presented on multi-national panels.

6.0 Governance and Budget

6.1 Governance

The AMC provides for direct input into Centre planning and activities to government policy makers, representatives of the lead universities, and NGOs through their memberships on the Centre's Board of Directors, its Program and Dissemination Committee (the central planning committee of the Centre), and its Domain Committees. The governance structure for the Centre is included in Appendix E.1.

Membership on the 2009-2010 Board of Directors and P&D Committee can be found in Appendices E.2 and E.3 respectively. The AMC structure of governance also provides for government and NGO membership on its peer-review Research Evaluation Committee (Appendix E.4). For a complete list of the AMC's government and NGO partners, see Appendix E.5.

There are three staff-members in the Halifax node office. Gloria Brazeau-Schiebel replaced Robert Nathan as the Centre Coordinator and Communications Officer in July 2009. Shiva Nourpanah was hired on part-time basis to replace Rebecca Rolfe in March 2009. Franklin Fezeu continues to work on a part-time casual basis as the AMC web master. A student intern, Val Billard was hired from February 22, 2010 until April 2, 2010 when Marley Levins took up her responsibilities to work on special events and projects, for ten hours a week. In the Moncton node administrative duties are shared by two part-time employees, Mathieu Lanteigne and Valérie Roy.

6.3 Budget

The AMC receives \$307,000 annually from SSHRC. It does not have any other sources of direct funding. 2009-10 expenditures were in the following general categories.

Expenditures exceeding annual revenue are covered by third party recoverables and a special KT fund established with monies generated by the 2008 National Metropolis Conference held in Halifax.

A detailed budget as well as projections for 2010-2011 is attached as Appendix E.5.

6.4 Support from Consortium Universities

The Halifax node of the AMC is now operating from a suite of offices in the Atrium Building, at Saint Mary's University. The space at Suite 213 has been generously donated by the University. In addition, Saint Mary's pays for fax, telephone and internet. The Moncton node is housed at the Université de Moncton where facilities are provided free of charge.

Each of the partner universities contributes a course release for its domain leaders (\$32,000). In addition, Moncton, Dalhousie and Saint Mary's each contribute \$8,000 in course releases for the Directors. Saint Mary's also provides accounting and administrative services to the AMC as well as technological support. Dalhousie and Moncton provide financial services, research services, computers and computer support and office supplies.

In addition, lead and partner institutions provided travel funding for Centre researchers and fellowship funding for graduate student training.

6.5 Non-Research Project Specific Funding from Federal Departments

Human Resources and Social Development provided \$9000 to the AMC to support student participation at the 12th National Metropolis Conference in Montreal. With this funding, the AMC was able to pay registration, travel and accommodation costs for seven students from four universities in three Atlantic provinces.

7.0 Future Planning

Together with our academic, community and government partners, the AMC looks forward to planning and delivering an exciting series of events and activities in line with AMC's mandate of bringing together researchers, community organizations, immigrant service providers and federal, provincial and municipal policy makers; contributing to new knowledge concerning population migrations, investigating models for influencing migration of particular relevance to Atlantic Canada, and contributing to effective policy development and practices in the region.

In particular, four priority areas have been identified which will require our focus in the upcoming year:

1. *Continue to develop and deliver a robust Knowledge Mobilization plan.* We hope to plan a series of events taking place at relevant faculties in universities across the region with the aim of raising awareness and fostering interest in immigration-related issues amongst newer students, as well as encouraging NGOs in Atlantic provinces other than Nova Scotia and New Brunswick to plan and create relevant events and plans through targeted projects such as the student intern sponsorship.
2. *Build the Justice, Policing and Security domain.* After the resignation of the Dr. Thibault from his position as domain leader in February 2010, other possible candidates have already been identified and will be approached with the intention of revitalizing this domain.
3. *Increase outreach to smaller communities.* In collaboration with NGOs and service-providers, we envisage activities focusing on outreach to smaller immigrant communities. These could include activities which are presented in the language of origin for specific groups of newcomer immigrants, raising their awareness and seeking feedback on related immigration issues.
4. *Increase international collaborations.* There promises to be a fruitful avenue for fresh and original comparative research on the impact of immigration in port cities in Canada and Europe, and the AMC looks forward to exploring this project further during the upcoming year. Meanwhile, the AMC continues to support and fund research affiliates for the 2010 International Metropolis Conference.

GUIDELINES FOR APPLICANTS FOR RESEARCH GRANTS 2009-2010

1. Eligibility

1.1 Applicants (i.e., Principal Investigators) must hold a regular academic appointment or a long-term appointment as a sessional lecturer at an Atlantic Canadian university. Professors Emeriti from these universities are eligible to apply. **All applicants must be formally affiliated with the Centre.**

1.2 Individuals who wish to become affiliated with the AMC may apply by completing an AMC Research Affiliation Application form available on the AMC web site at www.atlantic.metropolis.net.

2. Clarification of Terms: Co-Investigator, Collaborator, Graduate Student, NGO Partners

2.1 SSHRC's and the AMC's regulations are as follows:

a) A Co-Investigator is a Centre participant who is responsible for specific aspects of a research project. Graduate students may not be listed as Co-Investigators. Students are not permitted to assume responsibility for a research project in the event that the original Principal Investigator is unable to maintain principal responsibility and/or finish the project. SSHRC is also sensitive to the fact that students should be allowed to finish their studies with a minimum of interruptions;

b) Foreign researchers are to be categorized as Collaborators rather than as Co-Investigators. Research expenses of international collaborators are not eligible for SSHRC funding. However, travel and subsistence costs of foreign collaborators may be covered if these expenses are directly related to their participation in the research project.

c) Representatives of NGO partners are Collaborators rather than Co-Investigators.

3. General Principles and Conditions

3.1 It is the AMC's practice to consider only one application from any of our research affiliates in the strategic grant competition. For pilot projects research affiliates may submit one application on their own behalf OR one application on their own behalf and one on a student's behalf OR two on behalf of students.

3.2 Consideration will be given to all applicants, but funding will be provided based on the merit of individual applications, policy relevance, and potential contribution to the AMC's research mandate. At its own discretion, the Research Evaluation Committee may require further peer review of grant applications.

3.3 Proposals should be clear, justify the use of all monies requested, and provide all information requested on the application form.

3.4 Because the significance of the work is evaluated, applicants must provide a theoretical rationale and a full explication of methodology and data analysis.

3.5 Applicants must indicate as precisely as possible the policy linkages of the proposed research project, based on consultations with relevant policy-makers in CIC and/or in partnering federal departments (see Appendix A for a list of Metropolis Federal Partners); or with policy-makers at the provincial or municipal level.

3.6 Where appropriate, applicants must also indicate the specific implications of the research project for the concerns of, or for programs and services provided by other relevant stakeholders (e.g., multicultural groups, NGO's and other immigrant serving groups), based on direct consultations and/or involvement with these stakeholders.

3.7 Applicants must provide an abstract of the project (250 word maximum), including the name of the Principal Investigator (and Co-Investigator(s), if any) and project title.

3.8 The following elements must be addressed in the abstract:

- a) subject;
- b) objective(s);
- c) methodology;
- d) findings;
- e) likely conclusions in terms of:

- scientific implications (or repercussions) and applications (or concrete uses);

AND

- potential implications and applications for public policy and programs related to immigration and integration.

3.9 Applicants must provide a clear and innovative dissemination plan, consistent with the unique nature and expectations of the Metropolis Project. The project budget may take the requirements of the dissemination plan into account.

3.10 Grant funds may be used only for the project and purposes described in the application, subject to any special conditions given in the Notice of Award.

3.11 Investigators must also abide by the policies and regulations operative in their home university.

3.12 The transfer of funds from one budget category to another is permitted, within limits according to the needs of the research as it progresses.

3.13 Grant funds may not be used to provide honoraria or release time stipends for the Principal Investigator and/or Co-Investigators and/or Collaborators. However, NGOs may be reimbursed for their staff time spent on the study.

3.14 The use of funds for a previously unspecified cost or new budget item requires prior approval by the Chair of the Research Evaluation Committee. Please address your request to one of the AMC's Directors.

3.15 Funds will be transferred to the Principal Investigator in the form of a Trust Account to be established by the Office of Financial Services at the Principal

Investigator's home university. The transfer of funds must be requested by the Principal Investigator within 6 months of receipt of the letter of notification. Failure to request the release of funds within this time frame may result in reallocation of funds. For grants over \$10,000, 10 per cent of total funds will be withheld until the submission of a final report as per section 10.1.

3.16 Normally the term of the grant will be in accordance with the applicant's request or as negotiated with the AMC. The term may be extended for an additional period upon written request to the Directors of the Centre. Unspent funds are to be returned to the Centre at the conclusion of the project.

4. Termination

4.1 An award may be terminated if conditions are not observed. Unspent funds must be returned to the Centre if the award is terminated.

5. Grants

5.1 The applicant, his/her Department Chair (or Dean in non-departmentalized Faculties), and the University Research Grants Officer must sign the application. If the applicant is the Department Chair (or Dean), he/she will require the signature of the appropriate Dean (or Vice-President).

5.2 The Chair's signature signifies that he/she is aware of the application, approves of the use of department facilities, services or other resources as may be necessary for the work, and that the applicant has (or will be allowed) the necessary research time within his/her normal work schedule.

5.3 Principal Investigators must assume responsibility for any overdraft on the grants provided and they should not expect supplementary funding beyond the original grant from the AMC.

6. Student Support

6.1 The pay rate for Graduate Research Assistants (GRAs) may vary from university to university and from discipline to discipline, and also by the student's level in the graduate program. Applicants should consult with the appropriate office on their campus for their University's guidelines.

6.2 The AMC will contact the Principal Investigator once his or her grant has been disbursed to collect a list of all students working on AMC-funded research including names, level of academic study (e.g. M.A. or Ph.D.), academic discipline, and contact information.

6.3 Copies of all theses produced by students emanating from AMC-funded research should be forwarded to the AMC (electronic or unbound copies are preferred, in order to duplicate and forward them to the Metropolis Project Team in Ottawa). Distribution will be subject to embargos arising from university thesis regulations and copyrights.

6.4 An effort shall be made by the Principal Investigator to ensure significant student participation by involving student assistants in AMC-funded research projects in Metropolis conferences, seminars and workshops.

6.5 For grants over \$10,000, 60% of the total award amount must be allocated towards student training (e.g. student research assistants, student participation in Metropolis conferences, seminars and workshops). There is no minimum student allocation for pilot project grants.

7. Travel

7.1 In addition to transportation and accommodation costs, researchers may claim up to a maximum of \$47 per diem.

8. Other Budget Items on Detailed Budget Sheet

8.1 Professional/Technical Services – This category is intended to cover expenses such as computer programming, data cleaning, and completion of statistical runs. Items such as transcription or data entry are more appropriate for the category of Clerical/Support Staff.

8.2 Non-Disposable Equipment – This category is intended to cover the purchase or rental of such items as tape recorders, microphones, transcription equipment, etc., not computers.

8.3 Computer Hardware and Software – Applicants are reminded that the purchase and/or upgrading of computers must be fully justified given that participating universities are expected to provide infrastructural support for the AMC research program. For example, the replacement of an applicant's departmental issue computer is not eligible.

8.4 Other (Research) Expenses – This category is intended to cover such expenses as reimbursement of NGO staff time spent on the study; the provision of daycare services for study respondents during interviews; participants' honoraria, etc.

9. Evaluation and Evaluation Criteria

9.1 Grant applications will be reviewed by the Research Evaluation Committee which consists of nine members including,

- a) four academics drawn from outside Atlantic Canada and preferably affiliated with one of the other Metropolis Centres,
- b) one academic drawn from a collaborating Atlantic Canadian University,
- c) one federal representative,
- d) one provincial representative,
- e) one municipal representative
- f) one NGO representative.

There will also be a non-voting Chair of the Committee. The Research Evaluation Committee will make its recommendations to the Board of Directors, and the Board, in turn, will decide on grants on an annual basis. The decision of the Board of Directors on grant applications is final.

9.2 Funding will be based on the following criteria:

- a) Academic excellence of the researchers
- b) Merit of the proposed project
- c) Relevance of research for attraction, retention and integration of immigrants to Atlantic Canada
- d) Policy relevance of the proposal
- e) Clearly defined knowledge dissemination strategy
- f) Justification of the budget and the work plan

Priority will be given to projects that demonstrate collaboration among government, NGO and academic sectors and provide training opportunities for students.

10. Reports

10.1 Successful grantees are expected to produce a 20-25 page paper for the Atlantic Metropolis Centre Working Papers Series and to complete a project report at the conclusion of the project. Successful grantees are not eligible to reapply in subsequent Atlantic Metropolis Centre grant competitions if working papers are outstanding. In addition, for grants over \$10,000, 10 per cent of total funds will be withheld until these documents have been submitted.

10.2 In addition to the working paper, researchers are required to produce a maximum three-page summary which is to include key findings and policy implications.

10.3 The paper and summary (10.1 and 10.2) are to describe not only the research findings, conclusions and methodology but also - and in a substantive manner - the policy issue the research addresses and the implications of the research for policy and/or practice.

10.4 Grantees must provide annual updates on activities related to AMC-funded research projects, including publications, participation in conferences, workshops or seminars, project funding secured from other sources, etc. This information will be requested by Centre staff each spring and included in the AMC Annual Report.
